3. gets skill at comparing cultural/literary phenomena and at formulating conclusions, explaining and interpreting these phenomena in wider historical-literary, political, historical, ideological context

1. indicates the most important (generally acclaimed, the most commented, the most controversial, considered to be a breakthrough) works of Polish literature and pop culture
2. characterizes relationship of contemporary Polish literature towards world literature; applies comparative perspective

**in terms of skills:**

1. independently prepares an interpretation of selected literary works
2. establishes contemporary axiological tools and apply them to literature
3. writes a short interpretative essay or a review of a chosen work
4. takes part in panel discussion on contemporary literature

**On successful completion of this course, a student**

**in terms of knowledge:**

1. defines and describes basic phenomena and literary traditions of Balkan cultures
2. characterizes main contexts of Balkan literatures on the basic level
3. gets knowledge on the basic level in the field of specificity of historical-literary process and models of periodization related to literature of countries on the Balkan Peninsula
4. gets basic knowledge related to the most representative authors and literary works influencing particular literary systems of countries on the Balkan Peninsula

**in terms of skills:**

1. gets skill at connecting specific literary phenomena of countries on the Balkan Peninsula with analogous phenomena in other European literatures
2. gets skill at analyzing, interpreting and evaluating independently literary works of countries on the Balkan Peninsula

**in terms of social competences:**

1. uses properly basic notions and terminology in the field of theory of literature and history of literature of countries on the Balkan Peninsula

**Course learning content:**

Presentation of literature of countries on the Balkan Peninsula in chronological and typological approach on the basic level; showing crucial phenomena and literary traditions.  
Presentation of literary contexts of countries on the Balkan Peninsula on the basic level.  
Presentation of literary connections between countries on the Balkan Peninsula with Eastern and Western civilization circles on the basic level.  
Presentation of literary connections between countries on the Balkan Peninsula and Europe on the basic level.  
Presentation of discussed literary traditions in context of national and transnational ideas.  
Using properly basic notions and terms in the field of theory of literature and history of literature.

**Course name: 21st Century European Art Cinema: History, Myths, and Migrations**

**On successful completion of this course, a student**

**in terms of knowledge:**

1. knows the methods of film analysis and basic concepts in the field of film studies and understands their relationship with literary and cultural studies on Central Europe and the Balkans
2. knows the methods of analysing contemporary historical and migrant cinema, in particular from the countries of Central Europe and the Balkan Peninsula
3. understands the relationship between contemporary film art and European cultural, especially ancient, heritage; knows the mythologically rooted interpretations of films by such authors as: László Nemes, Yorgos Lanthimos, Paolo Sorrentino, Lars von Trier, Cristian Mungiu

**in terms of skills:**

1. analyses the meaning of film images of the past and the present in the context of literary and cultural discourses on history and collective identity, as well as problems of representation and cultural memory
2. prepares and makes an oral presentation in English on a selected issue in the field of film studies based on the suitable literature

**in terms of social competences:**

1. appreciates the importance of film studies on contemporary European cinema and their role in deepening the understanding and promotion of the cultural heritage of Central Europe and the Balkans

**Course learning content:**

Studies of films referring to the mythological tradition of antiquity and to European cultural heritage made by selected European filmmakers (Yorgos Lanthimos, Paolo Sorrentino, Andrei Zwiagintsev, Lars von Trier, Cristian Mungiu).

Studies of contemporary historical cinema from the Central and Eastern Europe and the Balkans in the context of the 20th-century history of the region.

Studies of selected examples of contemporary European migrant and diasporic cinema in the context of contemporary migratory movements.

Introduction of the the most important concepts (such as: shot, scene, mise-en-scène, dramaturgy, plot, etc.) and methods of film analysis and their relationship with literary studies.

Student presentations on a selected issue based on the suitable literature deepening reflection on the analysed films.

Course name: **Cultural and Literary Traditions of Central Europe**

**On successful completion of this course, a student**

**in terms of knowledge:**

1. defines and describes main conceptions about Central Europe
2. specifies a place of Central European literature and culture in a wider European context
3. relates and compares different literary, historical, cultural, political and social phenomena, motivate their influence on the form of modern Central European culture and particular regional states; construes chosen works, literary or artistic visions according to historical and literary context

**in terms of skills:**

1. builds coherent, critical comment (written or spoken) on the subject of Central Europe, finds adequate sources of information, competently and functionally uses knowledge from lectures and other sources
2. justifies his/ her interpretations, develops them and resolves them within the group; recapitulates his / her experience of reading
3. compiles knowledge gained during the classes, develops, clarifies and reconstructs the phenomena of cultural and literary history

**in terms of social competences:**

1. understands other cultures on the basis of the knowledge obtained; is aware of historical, political and cultural circumstances influencing artistic creations

**Course learning content:**

Explaining and briefly describing the history of the concept of Central Europe, diversity in its definition and its delimiting.

Presentation of the culture or traditions of Central Europe and historical, geopolitical, national, transnational, literary context of its existence.

Presentation of the most important phenomena and trends in Central European culture (literature), representative authors and texts of culture in relation to national communities.

Discussion on the social and political phenomena that determine the shape of literature and culture of selected Central European countries (in the past and currently).

Showing the relation between particular cultural events in Central Europe and similar phenomena in European literature, exposing the areas of identification and differentiation.

Presentation of the Central European tradition repertory in terms of community, identity, belonging; including the broader context of European traditions.

Showing the diversity of the region of Central Europe, the wealth of literary and cultural traditions of that space.

Presentation of Central Europe in geographical, political and social categories, as well as in reference to the national identities and cultural models.

Course name: **Computer Skills**

**On successful completion of this course, a student**

1. defines and describes at the basic level trends and phenomena of Central European literature; name them in synchronic and diachronic terms
2. specifies a place of Central European literature in a wider European context
3. relates and compares different literary, historical, cultural, political and social phenomena, motivate their influence on the shape of modern Central European culture; construes chosen literary works and phenomena in historical and literary context; basing on gained knowledge; understands other cultures
4. discusses and interprets the work of the most important Central European writers (such as for example: F. Kafka, B. Schulz, R. Musil, D. Kiš, W. Gombrowicz, J. Hašek, B. Hrabal, M. Kundera, Cz. Miłosz, G. Konrád, P. Esterházy)
5. compiles knowledge gained during the classes, develops, clarifies and reconstructs the literary history phenomena

**in terms of skills:**

1. interprets and analyzes literary works, refer to gained knowledge in terms of philology, literature, history and culture, literary genres, epochs etc.

2. justifies his / her own interpretative theses, develops them and explain them in the group, sums up and conclude his / her reading experience

**in terms of social competences:**

1. builds coherent, critical-literary comment (written or spoken), can find adequate sources of information, competently and functionally use knowledge from lectures and other sources

**Course learning content:**

Presentation of Central European literature in chronological and typological terms; showing the most important writers and their work (e.g. F. Kafka, B. Schulz, R. Musil, D. Kiš, W. Gombrowicz, J. Hašek, B. Hrabal, M. Kundera, Cz. Miłosz, G. Konrád, P. Esterházy etc.).

Showing relations between Central European literature of 20th and 21st century and periods and trends in European literature, displaying identification and differentiation planes / fields.

The range, position and meaning of Central European literature in the context of Slavonic, European and world culture.

Presentation of discussed literary phenomena against the background of historical, political and social events; political and historical determinants of Central European literature.

Presentation of discussed literary phenomena in interdisciplinary context.

Discussion on the suggested literature in the light of critical studies.

Analysis and interpretation of texts representing the canon of Central European literature.

Presentation of the most important trends in Central European literature (genres, themes, motives).

Course name: **Polish Literature in the European Context**

**On successful completion of this course, a student**

**in terms of knowledge:**

1. places Polish literature in the midst of selected European and global esthetical and philosophical currents and eras

2. show relations between selected processes observed in Polish literature with equivalent trends in other national literatures

3. describes selected literary phenomena like multilingual literature, literary masterpiece, emigre literature, literary reception

4. characterizes selected currents, genres, ideas of global literature which had a major impact on Polish literature in its history and those currents, genres, ideas in Polish literature which inspired and influenced other national literatures – and using those skills in required forms of written or oral presentation

**in terms of skills:**

1. compares works of selected Polish authors with works of the most prominent authors of European literature

**in terms of social competences:**

1. is able to show the importance of Polish literature in relation to cultural and literary studies and their role in the heritage of Central European countries and the Balkan Peninsula

**Course learning content:**

Transitions in ideas, currents, trends and genres (eg. humanism, manierism, historicism, messianic, epic, irony, modernism, postmodernism...).

Polish literature in the context of European literatures (the writer's place in society, reception strategies, literary market).

Global literature in relations to the world's history (literary works in relations to important historical events: the dusk of antiquity, Renaissance, the French Revolution and the industrial one, Napoleonic wars, the colonization and the decolonization, totalitarian regimes and the Holocaust, globalization processes...).

The masterpieces of the world's literature with their Polish translations and reception (eg. Oddysey, Hamlet, Faust, Madame Bovary, Anna Karenina, The Magic Mountain).

Polish writers and their reception of foreign influences (np. Górnicki vs Castiglione; Kochanowski vs Horace; Morsztyn vs Marino; Krasicki vs Rousseau; Mickiewicz vs Goethe; Norwid vs Baudelaire; Komornicka vs Woolf; Berent vs Nietzsche; Iwaszkiewicz vs Mann).

Periods in Polish, European and world literature.

Periods in Polish literature in the context of literature development general trends – shared and individual features.

Relations between Polish literature and other national literatures.

Relations between Polish literature and European/global art.

Key Polish authors and their works.

Masterpieces of Polish and world literature.



Nobel Price – authors, reception, prestige and discussions.

Course name: **European Ancient Literature – selected problems**

**On successful completion of this course, a student**

**in terms of knowledge:**

1. assigns particular texts to the authors of the discussed periods of Ancient Greece and Roma, describe life and literary work of the main poets and prose-writers of each period
2. arranges in chronological order events associated with the literature of a given period, distinguishes between particular literary genres
3. explains the most important historical, political and literary occurrences of the discussed periods of Ancient Greece and Roma
4. puts into words and refers the most important questions and problems associated with particular texts read in class
5. compares various approaches to the same subject, thread or motif in different texts of the period
6. has factual knowledge in the field covered by the lecture

**in terms of skills:**

1. uses literary sources and secondary literature with no assistance

**Course learning content:**

Greek literature of the archaic period – chronological and typological approach; most important writers and their work.

Greek literature of the classical period – chronological and typological approach; most important writers and their work.

Greek literature of the Hellenistic period – chronological and typological approach; most important writers and their work.

**On successful completion of this course, a student**

2. arranges in chronological order events associated with the literature of a given period, distinguishes between particular literary genres
3. explains the basic historical, political and literary occurrences of the discussed periods of Ancient Greece and Rome

**in terms of skills:**

1. puts into words and refers the most important literary features associated with texts discussed in class
2. compares various approaches to the same subject, thread or motif in different texts of the period

Course name: **Ancient Popular Topoi and Motifs in Culture and Literature**

**On successful completion of this course, a student  
in terms of knowledge:**

1. understands the research problems and the recent achievements in the field covered by the lecture
2. is able to present the crucial research methodologies (both contemporary and earlier) and their mutual influence and relationships
3. has extensive factual knowledge in the field covered by the lecture

**in terms of skills:**

1. knows how to critically evaluate the importance and usefulness of various methodological perspectives applied to analysing and interpreting the relationship between ancient and modern culture
2. has the basic bibliographic information necessary to further research the subject matter of the lecture

**Course learning content:**

Concepts and ideas: motif, commonplace, theme, symbol, archetype, myth.

Classical motifs reworked in modern culture.

Homeric epic about war and travelling: short history of the universal metaphors of human life.

Ancient bestiary and modern posthuman reflections.

Ancient poleology in modern guise: motif of the city (and its ruins) in contemporary art and literature.

Course name: **Masterpieces of Polish literature**

**On successful completion of this course, a student  
in terms of knowledge:**

1. points the masterpieces and the most prominent works, names in general terms the eras they belong to and the literary work's place in the cultural tradition
2. analyzes and interprets the prominent literary works in the context of the eras they belong to and with engagement of selected methodologies
3. establishes the significance of the works discussed in class for the national tradition and their role in the self-identification and national identity building processes

**in terms of skills:**

1. uses the methods of analysis, interpretation and evaluation of literary works during the reading process and establishes what singles out a work to be named a masterpiece in a given culture
2. uses literary works as a source of knowledge about history and societies

**in terms of social competences:**

1. points at the ways masterpieces function within social circulation (their place in didactics, quotations, theatrical and film adaptations etc.) and is aware of the consequent place they hold in the general consciousness

**Course learning content:**

Polish masterpieces in historical context.

The criteria allowing to distinguish a masterpiece in literature.

Literary currents, conventions, genres and types of literature in a culture.

A work of art as a carrier of certain values and worldviews and the essential element in a tradition.

A work of art as a source of historical knowledge and history as a context for interpretation of a literary work.
